For the past two years, CCRY network communities have been instrumental in helping to shape the Alliance for Quality Career Pathways (AQCP) framework. During the fall meeting we discussed how the framework and self-assessment tool could be used to assess the comprehensiveness and quality of local career pathways and systems.
