

Delaware Child Care Spending, FY 2001-2006 (in millions of dollars)

*In years prior to FY 2005, Delaware reported spending above its CCDBG MOE requirement. In FY 2005, Delaware made downward accounting "adjustments" to CCDBG MOE expenditures reported in prior years, which resulted in Delaware reporting a net negative \$8.5 million in CCDBG expenditures in FY 2005. It is unclear the extent to which the decline in spending reflects an actual decline in expenditures or just accounting modifications. In FY 2005, DE also made a negative TANF transfer out of CCDBG. Based on this, DE child care spending in FY 2005 is probably not comparable to previous or subsequent year expenditures.

¹To calculate total child care spending in a federal fiscal year, we sum state and federal CCDBG funds (including liquidated TANF transfers to CCDBG and CCDBG funds appropriated in prior years but liquidated in the given year); TANF funds spent directly on child care; and additional state TANF MOE. Analysis of state fiscal year expenditures may differ. ²State TANF MOE spent on child care included in the sum of total child care spending excludes funds that may have been counted towards CCDBG MOE. ³This is the total amount transferred to CCDBG in 2005 or 2006 regardless of whether it was liquidated in that year. TANF transfers that were liquidated

in 2005 or 2006 are included above as CCDBG discretionary spending.


⁴This is the total amount of state TANF MOE spent on child care and includes funds that may also have been counted towards CCDBG MOE. In 2006, CCDBG mandatory funding was increased by \$200 million. States were required to obligate, or legally commit, their share of these funds in 2006 but have until 2007 to spend them.
