

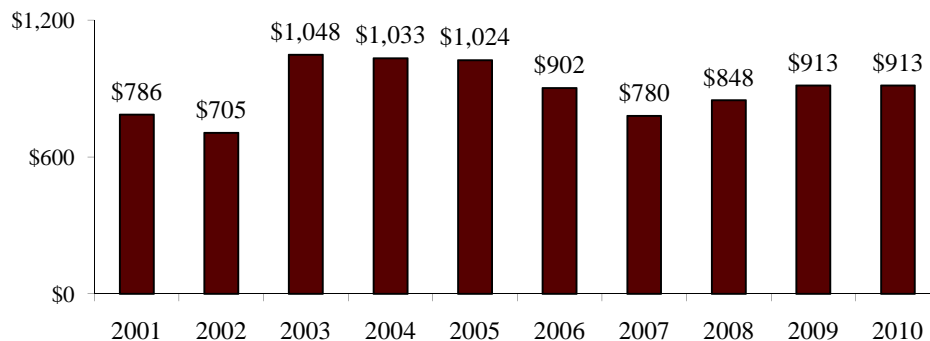

Analysis of state fiscal year expenditures may differ.

<sup>2</sup>State TANF MOE spent on child care included in the sum of total child care spending excludes funds that may have been counted towards CCDBG MOE.

<sup>3</sup>This is the total amount transferred to CCDBG in 2009 or 2010 regardless of whether it was liquidated in that year. TANF transfers that were liquidated in 2009 or 2010 are included above as CCDBG discretionary spending.

<sup>4</sup>This is the total amount of state TANF MOE spent on child care and includes funds that may also have been counted towards CCDBG MOE.

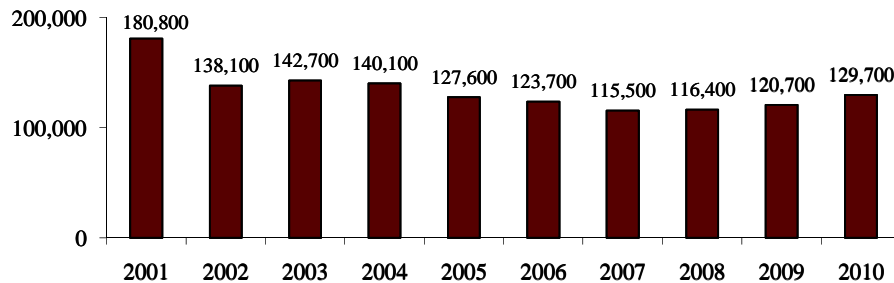

Average Monthly Number of Children Served in CCDBG in New York



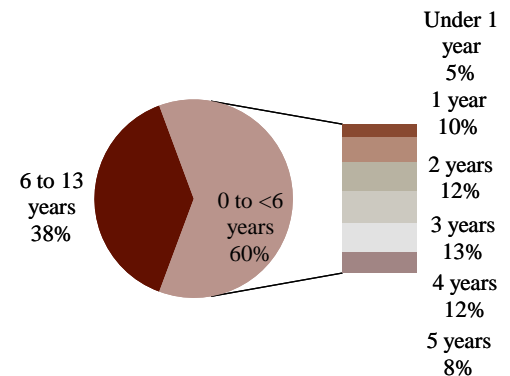
The number of children NY reported serving in FY 2001 included some "double-counted" children. NY's reporting system was revised in FY 2002 to eliminate double-counts.

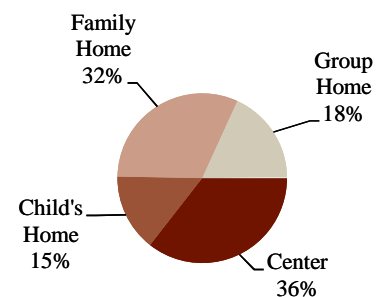
