

For further explanation of these categories, see http://www.clasp.org/publications/ccspending_notes.pdf. Analysis of state fiscal year expenditures may differ.

²State TANF MOE spent on child care included in the sum of total child care spending excludes funds that may have been counted towards CCDBG MOE.

³This is the total amount transferred to CCDBG in 2006 or 2007 regardless of whether it was liquidated in that year. TANF transfers that were liquidated in 2006 or 2007 are included above as CCDBG discretionary spending.

⁴This is the total amount of state TANF MOE spent on child care and includes funds that may also have been counted towards CCDBG MOE. In 2006, CCDBG mandatory funding was increased by \$200 million.




Child Care Participation State Profile
