

Los Angeles County is home to 10,000 current and former foster youth, ages 16-24. Transition-age foster youth are resilient, resourceful, and determined. The LA OYC is building partnerships across multi-sectors to improve educational and employment outcomes for transition age foster youth.

The OYC works collaboratively with over 50 partners, including government agencies, education institutions, philanthropic and community-based organizations, and private sector employers.

Key Partners include: Department of Children and Family Services, John Burton Advocates for Youth, iFoster, LA Area Chamber, Children's Law Center of California, Coalition for Responsible Community Development, the public workforce development system, National Center for Youth Law, Los Angeles Unified School District, and Los Angeles County Office of Education.
