The criminal justice system plays a prominent role in limiting economic mobility, especially for youth of color. Our response requires investments that prevent systeminvolvement, reduce harm to youth in the system, and support them when they come home. The Realizing Youth Justice framework establishes principles to guide our advocacy: focus on equity, recognizing youth as assets and centering their voices, and pushing for solutions that are data-informed, community-driven, culturally relevant, and developmentally appropriate. The current political climate also requires that we guard against efforts to roll back civil rights protections, slash budgets, and undermine progress in police reform.

Join us for an optional pre-meeting session where we will explore federal policies and actions that have negative implications on youth and young adults of color; and the role of workforce development and investments in youth systems to advancing youth justice.
