

## Federal Work-Study

The President's budget proposes **\$500,000,000** for Federal Work-Study, a **51%** cut to the current federal funding level. Below is an estimate of how much Federal Work-Study funding each state would lose under the President's proposal, as well as the number of students that would lose work-study slots.<sup>1</sup>
