

Background

Over the past several years, many communities have invested in considerable capacity-building and innovation to reach and reconnect youth who are *disconnected* from school and employment. While federal funding for much of this activity is retrenching, many of these communities continue to engage in this important work. CCRY Network is an outgrowth of those communities that started with the US Department of Labor's Youth Opportunity Movement and decided it was important to continue their cross-system work on behalf of disconnected youth and to network across communities to share lessons, innovations, and success stories. The network has since expanded to include communities that are invested in this youth population and the cross-systems solutions needed to ensure their education and economic success.

The network was formed to:

- Serve as a collective learning environment, promoting peer-to-peer exchange and hands-on assistance in implementing and expanding best practice especially in communities with high levels of youth distress,
- Serve as a communications vehicle to bring attention to the work and innovative practice that is occurring in communities across the country, and
- Have a collective voice and make input into state and federal policy on issues affecting disconnected youth in distressed communities.

Since 2006, the Network has convened semi-annually in host communities bringing teams to the forums to focus on issues, policies and strategies to enhance service delivery to vulnerable youth. CLASP serves as a convener and works with the communities to make the connections between federal policy and local practice. Many national organizations have been active in supporting the Network activities including the National Youth Employment Coalition, the US Conference of Mayors, the National League of Cities, the Corps Network, and FHI360 (formerly AED).
